The City of Oklahoma City has been developing the first new comprehensive plan since 1977, plan**okc**. A comprehensive plan is a policy document used by city leaders, developers, business owners and citizens to make decisions about future growth and development.

You are invited to review and comment on the draft of plan**okc**. Please visit <u>http://okc.opencomment.us</u>, create a login, and get started. The comment period will run through the middle of March.

Oklahoma City has a lot of land, relatively uncongested roads and, compared to the U.S. average, a low cost of living. This has enabled development to spread out at low densities across our 621 square miles. The challenge the City faces is making sure they can provide quality public services like fire and police protection, water, sewer, trash, roads and parks to a growing area without much adjustment in revenue. The City funds day-to-day operations through sales tax revenues. That funding is spread thin when there is infrastructure being extended to far-reaching areas of the city, while existing infrastructure in the core of the city is often underutilized.

A word from one of our Police Community Relations Officers: MSgt. Robert Skalla, Hefner Division PCR

Will changing the environment also change criminal behavior?

Absolutely yes! We the people have the ability to directly influence and mitigate the risk of crime in our neighborhoods, parks, schools, commercial areas, parking lots and surrounding areas.

Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) encompasses 4 basic principles that have proven to displace and mitigate criminal activity when implemented properly.

So what is Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design? The proper design and effective use of the built environment; leading to a reduction in the incidence of crime and an improvement in the quality of life. The basic principles of CPTED are (1) natural surveillance, (2) natural access control, (3) territorial reinforcement and (4) a maintenance plan.

Author Jane Jacobs wrote the book *The Death and Life of Great American Cities* emphasizing the concept of "Eyes on the Street" which is the ability to increase observant behavior and impart upon the criminal (abnormal user) the feeling of always being watched.

Want to learn more about CPTED? I will soon be offering Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design presentations at the Hefner briefing station that will be open to all residents.

CITY OF OKC OFFERS RAIN BARREL DISCOUNT

The City of Oklahoma City and the Central Oklahoma Storm Water Alliance (COSWA) are partnering to encourage residents to conserve water and reduce pollution through the use of rain barrels.

The organizations are offering a discounted rain barrels online at <u>upcycle-products.com</u> starting \$61 plus \$2.50 online handling fee. Residents should click on "order forms" on right side of web page and choose "Oklahoma City." The deadline to order is March 15.

"Rain barrels collect water that drains from your home's gutter system," Environmental Protection Manager Raymond Melton said. "Watering with rain water is better for your plants and it's free."

The City's urban agriculture ordinance allows a maximum of two 85gallon rain barrels in the front yard. Any number of rain barrels can be placed on the side or back of property as long as they are not visible from the street. The containers must be securely covered and any openings must be covered with a screen that prevents the infestation of insects and other pests.

Rain barrels ordered online can be picked up between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on March 20 or between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. on March 21 from the City's Household Hazardous Waste Facility, 1621 S. Portland.

Oklahoma City Council Elections March 3

Oklahoma City residents will head to the polls on March 3 to elect council representation for wards 2, 6 and 8. The general election, if needed will be April 7. Those elected will be sworn in on April 14.

Ward 5 councilman David Greenwell was automatically re-elected because he drew no opposition in his ward. The following candidates have filed with the Oklahoma County Election Board and the City Clerk's Office:

Ward 2: James Cooper, Major L. Jemison, John Riley, Ed Shadid (incumbent)

Ward 6: Dario Alvarado, Meg Salyer (incumbent), Bob Waldrop

Ward 8: Steve Curry, John Alan Ederer, Mark Stonecipher

Council members serve four-year terms with an annual salary of \$12,000.

The qualifications for City Council are as follows:

- Must be a United States citizen
- Must be at least 21 years old
- Must be a three-year resident of Oklahoma City
- Must be a six-month resident of the ward filing in
- Must be a qualified voter in Oklahoma City
