Red Cross and Oklahoma City announce storm shelter rebate program

Oklahoma City homeowners have a chance to receive up to a \$2,500 rebate on the purchase and installation of a new storm shelter thanks to a \$2.075 million grant funded by the American Red Cross of Central Oklahoma. Homeowners who live in the Oklahoma City limits can apply now through September 30 online at www.okc.gov to participate in the program. A total of 830 rebates will be available to addresses chosen by an electronic lottery. A maximum reimbursement of \$2,500 is available per home selected. Industry experts estimate shelters range anywhere from \$2,000 to \$8,000.

Free Landfill Day Saturday, September 13 Oklahoma City residents can get rid of big junk at no cost and without waiting for Bulk Waste Day. Free Landfill Day is from 7am to 3pm at participating landfills:
-East Oak Landfill – 3201 Mosley Rd. (N.E. 36, east of Sooner Road, south side of street)

- -Oklahoma City Landfill 7001 S. Bryant
- -Oklahoma Landfill 7600 SW 15
- -Northeast Landfill 2601 N. Midwest Boulevard, Spencer, Okla. (construction / demolition materials only)

Each residential household may drop off one load using a passenger vehicle or truck up to a 1-ton and one trailer up to 16-feet long. Please, no commercial waste haulers.

A word from one of our PCR Officers: MSgt Erick Huff, Santa Fe Division

I know many people are concerned about the threat of rising crime in their communities. There are several ways to help protect your home as well as your neighborhood. From simple things like keeping your doors locked to starting a neighborhood watch program. So in the spirit of National Night Out here are a few tips to keep your neighborhood safe.

- Stay in touch with Neighborhood Alliance make sure all of your new neighborhood officers go through officer training.
- Work with the local Police. The Police are a source of information and training.
- Hold regular meetings to help residents get to know each other and come up with strategies to improve your area.
- Canvass door-to-door to recruit members.
- Ask neighbors to look out for and report unusual activity in the neighborhood.
- Translate newsletters into Spanish or other languages needed by non-English speakers in your community. If necessary have translators at your meetings.
- Gather facts about crime in your neighborhood. Learn residents perception of crime. Often residents perceptions are not supported by fact, and accurate information can reduce the fear of crime. The monthly crime stats can help you communicate the facts to your neighbors.
- Sponsor cleanups, encourage residents to beautify the area. Physical conditions like abandoned cars or overgrown vacant lots contribute to crime these should be reported to the Action Center 297-2535.
- Work with businesses to repair rundown storefronts, and clean up littered streets.
- Emphasize the importance of a Neighborhood Watch program. Also emphasize that Watch groups are not vigilantes and should not
 assume the role of Police. Their duty is to as neighbors to be alert, observant, and caring, and to report suspicious activity or crimes
 immediately to the Police. Call Neighborhood Alliance to schedule your neighborhood watch training!
