



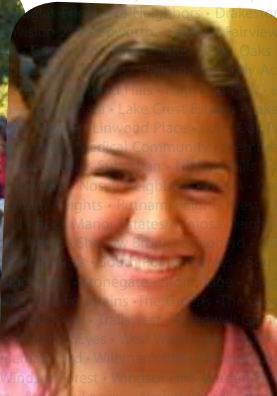

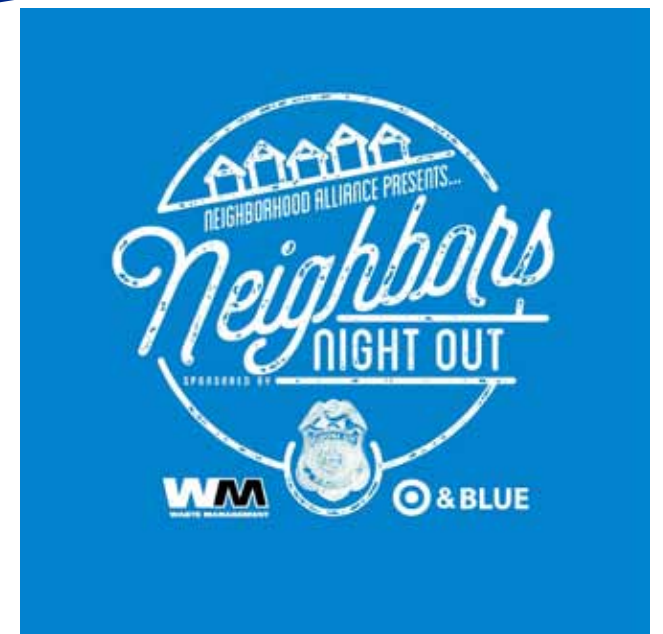


Medical Community Neighborhood Association Celebrates Neighbors Night Out!

Party your way to a safer neighborhood? Absolutely!!! Medical Community Neighborhood (located just South of the Governor's Mansion) certainly knows this is true. Every fall Neighborhood Alliance and the Oklahoma City Police Department host the city-wide Neighbors Night Out, where all neighborhoods are encouraged to host a social, as a way for neighborhood residents to get to know each other. After all, a more social neighborhood has less crime.

Each year Jerry Cable and his fellow neighborhood members host a giant party in Nichols Park. They typically hire a DJ and have bouncy houses for the kids and have 300-500 in attendance. You will see kids dance with firemen and police officers, and they even have social service agencies host information booths so everyone can learn about available resources. Neighbors, friends and co-workers all donate what they can (cash, prizes, labor, etc.) to make this event happen.

You don't have to start out with 500 people. Simply invite your block or your entire neighborhood down to your yard and serve cookies or ask everyone to bring something to share. Recovery - One Community at a Time

In 2015 United Way of Central Oklahoma awarded Neighborhood Alliance a generous Tornado Recovery grant to help neighborhoods affected by the May 2013 tornados. Eight neighborhoods worked with Neighborhood Alliance to identify and rebuild their destroyed entry ways, ponds, and playgrounds that stood as tangible reminders of the tragedy known only as May 2013.



Eight neighborhoods were helped, including Steelman Estates, a tight-knit mobile home community in Pottawatomie County. Their homes and lives have slowly been rebuilt, but 2 years later, the Ford F-150 truck that was catapulted by the tornado into their community pond still stood as a daily reminder of the horrific event. Through this partnership, the neighbors were able to professionally remove the mangled truck from the pond, bringing the community one step closer to healing.

In 2016 this program will continue by helping 5 more neighborhoods to repair/replace tornado damage. When Lions Club heard about the project, they offered \$90,000 to professionally plant trees in the neighborhoods devastated in May 2013. Neighborhood Alliance will manage the huge "NeighborROOTS" program with the generous financial commitments from United Way and Lions Club.

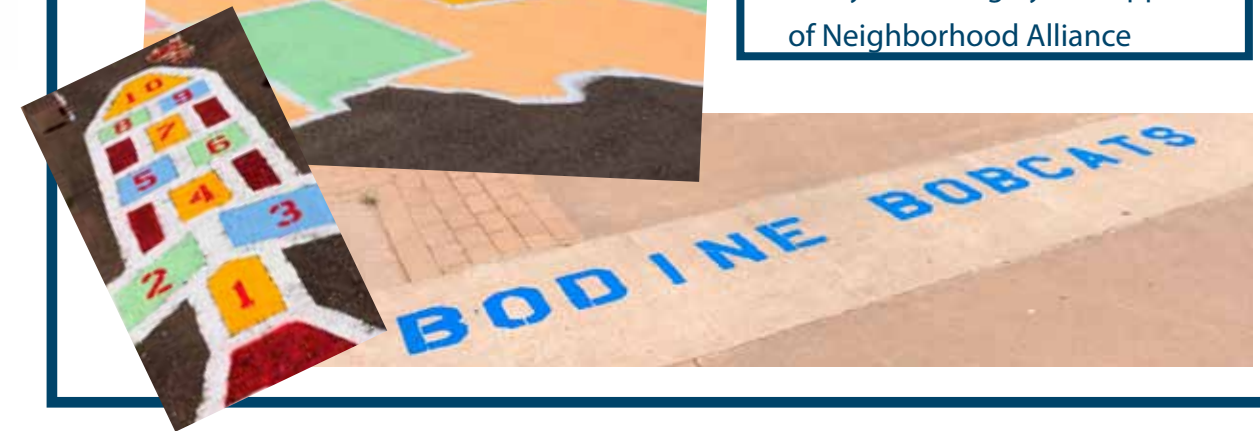
South OKC School Connections

When a weekend of volunteer work can create a year of smiles, you know you are making a difference. Last fall the Boeing Corporation asked us to coordinate a Day of Service for their employees as part of their global day of service. The Principals at both Bodine and Hayes Elementary Schools jumped at the chance for help. On a windy Saturday in October more than 25 volunteers from Boeing gathered at Bodine and Hayes Elementary for a morning of painting. Neighborhood Alliance supervised and provided all the materials. The hard surfaces in the schools playground areas were transformed from plain concrete or asphalt to areas where kids can play foursquare, hopscotch, and basketball. Bodine even has a HUGE map of the United States stenciled on the ground so kids can learn geography while playing. Thanks to our sponsors and volunteers, a weekend of work has brought joy and happiness to hundreds of kids in South OKC.

has hosted "I HEART my Neighborhood," an intensive week of home rehabbing, beautification and renewed hope for 2-3 low-income neighborhoods and the families that live there. These projects not only change the lives of the residents but they sometimes save many of these homeowners from homelessness due to severe code violations or allow Senior Citizens to live in their homes longer.

Held every year in June, approximately 300 youth from across the United States convene in OKC in order to help low-income neighborhoods thrive.
